
Volunteer with us



Marie Weller Primary School Celebrates Official Opening with Community



Marie Weller Primary School, the newest addition to The Hawksmoor Learning Trust, officially opened its doors to the local community in a celebration that honoured both its educational mission and the remarkable woman whose name it bears.

While the school has been welcoming pupils since 2021, this established institution took the opportunity to celebrate with Towcester's community, marking a significant milestone for the growing Trust.



A Community Celebration

The official opening welcomed distinguished guests including members of Marie Weller's own family - Peter Ashby and Janet Bloomfield - alongside Councillor Rachel Dando L'Olive, the new Mayor of Towcester, representatives from the Women's Institute, and other local community leaders.

Mr Cox, the school's Headteacher, shared the school ethos and values that have been inspired by Marie's story. Guests were treated to a wonderful welcome featuring music, singing, and readings performed by pupils from across the trust's schools, showcasing the collaborative spirit that defines The Hawksmoor Learning Trust.

Creating Lasting Memories

The ceremony's highlights included the unveiling of a stunning new mural dedicated to Marie Weller's life and the symbolic planting of a tree to mark the beginning of 'Weller Woods' - the school's dedicated Forest School area. Pupils from all trust schools participated in engaging arts and sports activities, bringing the entire educational community together.

Miss Curtis, CEO of The Hawksmoor Learning Trust, reflected on the achievement:
"We are incredibly proud to have established another great school to serve our Towcester community. Our heartfelt thanks go to Sue Hamilton of the Towcester WI as well as Chris Lofts and Max Marchini, our dedicated trustees, who were instrumental in bringing Marie's inspiring story to light. We have thoughtfully woven our school values around her courageous spirit, ensuring her legacy of standing up for what's right continues to inspire future generations."





Remembering Marie Weller

Marie Weller was a brave Towcester woman who became a local hero in the fight for women's suffrage. Born on 2nd September 1877, she dedicated herself to the cause of giving women the right to vote, earning recognition with a special certificate and medal from the famous Suffragette leader, Mrs Pankhurst. On 8th January 1910, Marie led a pivotal meeting at Towcester Town Hall that helped change history. She lived to see the victory of universal suffrage in 1928 and died on 17th October 1936, leaving behind a legacy of courage and determination for equality.



The celebration perfectly captured the school's commitment to honouring local history while building a bright future for Towcester's children.

Towcester Toy Bank (TTB) was set up in 2020 by mother and daughter, Annie and Katrina, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic that left many families struggling to provide gifts for their children due to job losses and/or illness, for example.

In light of the ongoing rise in living costs for families, the Christmas Toy Bank has become an annual initiative. In 2025, we will celebrate our sixth year. In 2024, we provided support to over 100 families referred by local schools, churches, social workers, and Family Centres; fulfilling 250 children's gift bags—nearly three times the amount completed in the first year.

The Towcester Toy Bank elves are very busy planning ahead for Christmas 2025, with the continued support of the Rotary Club and Whittlebury Hall. Last Christmas, with the amazing support of our fantastic community, the 1,000th Christmas gift bag was delivered to a local family.

More than 700 representatives from communities across the UK came together with celebrities to encourage policymakers to take steps towards an Essentials Guarantee. This would ensure that Universal Credit is fit for purpose, making it unnecessary for people to have to use a food bank.

Jacob Forman, Director at Epping Forest Foodbank, said: "We have not asked our MPs for the impossible. Instead, we have shared our vast experiences to highlight the actions that can genuinely change the life circumstances of the people we see every day for the better. As politicians sit on their benches, I hope our words resonate with them and encourage them push for a stronger social security system that ensures everyone can afford the essentials."

After Covid, Emma struggled to return to school and her mum gave up her job to look after her.

Without her mum's income, money was tight and there were often days in the month when there was no food in the house.

Towcester Foodbank was able to help ensure that the family had enough to eat until Emma had finished school and her mum was able to return to work.

Being part of an active community

In May, Renew169 Wellbeing Café started a new Community Garden, thanks to the Tove Valley Centre giving us the use of their allotment space and poly tunnel. It is a place for people to join together, make new friends, learn new skills, enjoy some exercise in the open air and support each other, and the charity, through sharing the work, seeds, plants and also to raise funds by selling the plants and produce we grow.

The team, led by Head gardener Madeline, prepared the space by rotovating and tidying the plots ready for planting up. Over following few weeks, a steady group of volunteers transformed the space from an overgrown, barren patch to the start of a thriving garden, with flowers, vegetables, herbs and fruit canes all starting to grow and flourish.

A couple of months on from the start, we can see the positive change we've made to the garden. The fruit and vegetables are coming along nicely: Tomatoes, both Cherry and Beefsteak varieties, Cauliflower, Runner Beans, Beetroot, Onions, Sweetcorn, Broccoli, Peppers and Courgettes are all growing.

The compost bins have been cleared, repaired and ready for use again, the herb beds brought back to life and the poly tunnel is now full of plants.

We have been overwhelmed by the generosity of the local community, donating pots and containers, compost, plants, seeds and tools to help get us started. This has helped us to raise money for the charity by selling containers planted up with shrubs and flowers, house plants, tomato plants and the early harvest from the soft fruit bushes.

The Community Garden is open for anyone that wants to do a bit of gardening and is at the Tove Valley Centre, located on Northampton Road, between the Shires Estate and the Tove Long Stay Car Park. It is open Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10.30M to 1.00PM so if you would like to come along and give it a try you will be made very welcome.

The Renew169 Wellbeing Café is a quiet shared space where it is OK to not be OK.

It is a safe space, located in the heart of Towcester, where people with emotional or mental health difficulties are welcomed, with an aim to reduce loneliness and isolation.

Visitors can be assured of a warm welcome and someone to listen. Attendees have the opportunity to take part in hobbies, crafts and activities, guided by the 5 ways to wellbeing, and enjoy the café space.

It is with great sadness we share the news that Ian has passed away, just two weeks after so generously sharing his beautifully restored Delorean at the Fete. As Ian soon visits St Lawrence for one last time, our thoughts and prayers go to all of Ian's family.



My name is Jane Jakes, I am part of the ministry team in the Tove Benefice, and work alongside the clergy. I was delighted to be invited to write the article on behalf of St Lawrence's Church, for this edition of the Town Crier.

The parish church of St Lawrence sits unobtrusively in the heart of Towcester, just along from the Town Hall and the Market Square. It has stood there since the 15th Century, a visible Christian presence in the community.

But I wonder how many of Towcester's residents (recorded as 11,542 in the 2021 census, and continuing to grow) have ever been inside? As you stroll round Towcester; pop into the Co-op for a pint of milk; stop for a coffee in one of the cafés; or hope to find a bargain in a charity shop; do you ever consider visiting the church?

Since joining the ministry team, I am often in St Lawrence's during the week and am surprised by just how many people do call in: former residents of Towcester back for the day and wanting to visit their old church; people interested in historic churches, pleased to see a history leaflet just inside the door; a member of the church returning a book from the sharing library; or someone coming in to find the peace and sanctuary that only a church can offer

St Lawrence Church is there for everyone – the residents of Towcester and anyone else who would like to visit. You don't have to belong to the church or have ever stepped inside a church before. It is open every day during the hours of daylight; it is open because visitors are welcomed and expected.

So why might you want to step inside? Perhaps curiosity, having learnt that it is open and visitors are welcome?

Perhaps because it is an historic building and that interests you? Perhaps you would like to find a quiet place to rest awhile, away from the noise and busyness of this modern world? Perhaps because you would like to be in a building where prayers have been said for hundreds of years and add your own?

Matthew 11:28 "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest."

Throughout the generations, people have taken to God, their celebrations, their sad times and all their ordinary times. You may like to do that too; just sit in the quietness of an empty church, feel the peace that only a place of prayer can evoke and share with God all that you are thinking and feeling.

It is your church; everyone is invited to spend time there, alone or at any of the Sunday services. As the former archbishop of Canterbury William Temple said: 'The church is the only society that exists for the benefit of those who are not its members.'



Wildlife on our doorstep

There's a new animal disease making its presence known. Known as the Usutu virus (USUV), it primarily affects blackbirds and is transmitted by mosquitoes. Currently, the disease is limited to urban areas and larger towns, but as our climate continues to warm, there's a possibility that it may spread more extensively.

Precautions to Prevent Disease Spread
It is essential for us to take steps to prevent
the spread of the disease.

- Bird Baths: Empty and refill them every few days to stop mosquito larvae from developing.
- Water Storage: Ensure lids are fitted on water butts, turn over bins and wheelbarrows to avoid water accumulation, and clean out gutters to minimize mosquito breeding habitats.
- Feeder Maintenance: As previously mentioned regarding the prevention of Trichomonosis, which has severely impacted our greenfinch and chaffinch populations, be sure to clean and disinfect your feeders regularly. Sweep the area beneath the feeders, and if possible, change their location periodically.

Lastly, there's no need to panic; human cases of USUV infection are quite rare.

Talking about mosquitoes, I've just returned from a rail trip to France. The holiday focused on wildlife in the La Brenne region, located near Tours. This relatively flat area is dotted with numerous lakes, originally created by monks for fish farming. The abundance of lakes contributes to a rich variety of wildlife.

Each time we stopped at a site and stepped out of the mini-bus, we were greeted by the melodies of nightingales, the calls of cuckoos, and the coos of turtle doves. These sounds would have been familiar in our own country less than a century ago.

Another bird we frequently heard was the Golden Oriole. Slightly smaller than a jackdaw, it boasts a striking yellow body and black wings. However, you may have noticed I mentioned we heard the oriole rather than saw it; this bird is notoriously elusive, revealing its presence only through its flute-like song. While it has bred in the UK, it is likely now extinct.





As I pen this article, the Hummingbird Hawkmoth will be on the wing. Thanks to its lengthy flight season, you'll still have the opportunity to spot it on sunny days, as it is active during daylight hours. This moth is quite widespread, providing a good chance of encountering it. True to its name, it mimics a hummingbird in flight.

Its orange-brown hindwings and underside are noticeable as it swiftly flits between plants, hovering to feed on the tubular flowers of various species, including: Viper's Bugloss, Red Valerian, Phlox, Jasmine, Buddleias, Petunia, and Lilac.

We have observed this remarkable moth here at Malthouse Court, and it is one of the 45 species of butterflies and moths we have documented.



Back in January, we entered the GB Cup – a competition for UK registered camera clubs. Images are of a very high standard, with those judged the best published in a virtual catalogue. This year, we had two acceptances and a string of near misses, with the following images published amongst the judges' best:

We enjoy our friendly annual head-to-head with Olney Camera Club, and we were able to avenge last year's defeat with a 340-337 victory this year. The open theme enabled a wide range of entries from abstract through architecture, aeronautical to nature and once again it was an enjoyable evening. Kudos to Kevin Adams of TDPS who was awarded "best image on the night" with his Republic P47D Thunderbolt. (right)

Recent programme highlights have included Jonathan Vaines' "The Little Print Show", Keith Millard's "Image Creation -Inspired by the Impressionists", Andy Sands' "Secret Britain" covering British bird, mammal, insect, fungus & slime mould subjects that are more secretive in nature, and our internal colour vs mono member led evening - where members presented pairs of the same image in colour and mono - was really instructive for all. A number of club members will join the fabulous Andy Sands on a workshop in the Autumn, learning from a real maestro of macro in the field, adding to the increasing number of practical events and workshops we are organising, including the recently concluded Osprey hide trip to Rutland.



A Walk Through Time and Tranquillity

Take a step back in time, and into nature, with a delightful circular walk from Towcester to the charming hamlet of Hulcote. This route, created by Adventure Geek, is just over 4 miles and blends countryside calm with historical intrigue, making it the perfect morning or afternoon escape.

Starting in the Heart of History

Begin your journey from the Tove Short-Stay Car Park in Towcester, one of the oldest continuously inhabited towns in the country. If you haven't yet visited Bury Mount, we recommend making time to explore this minimountain and its sweeping stone timeline, which tells Towcester's 2,000-year story, from Roman roots to coaching town fame.

Through Woods and Fields to Hulcote

The walk leads you out of town via a secret archway beside a chestnut tree, opening into peaceful woodland and open fields where sheep often graze. Before long, you'll find yourself stepping over stiles and into the tiny hamlet of Hulcote, which forms part of the Easton Neston Estate. The estate is linked to the architect Nicholas Hawksmoor, and you'll spot his influence in Hulcote's hexagonal Gothic-style cottages, built in the early 19th century with distinctive chequered brickwork.

Ducks, Fords & Hidden Lanes

After weaving through the village, the route continues past quacking ducks, a charming wooden footbridge, and a shallow ford, ideal for a summer paddle or a reflective photo moment. A peaceful farm track and a brief stretch along the A43's safe walking path eventually return you into town via a shaded woodland path.

Did You Know:

- Hulcote once housed a Victorian school and has strong estate roots.
- The Easton Neston estate was home to the influential Fermor-Hesketh family.
- Towcester features in the Domesday Book and was once known as Lactodurum in Roman times.

Fancy a Drink After Your Walk?

Towcester Mill Brewery, located just minutes from the end of the walk, is an ideal finishing point. With a large beer garden, rich local history, and award-winning brews, it's a favourite with locals and visitors alike.

Preserving Towcester's Visual History

Our archive contains a remarkable number of photographs of the town, with many of the photographs dating from the 1900s and later. These have been used in our publications and quite a few are available on the 'Towcester History and Photographs' Facebook Group, which has now been going for more than a decade.

The Facebook site is run in collaboration with the Society and has a good following. It has attracted more than 5000 members and the Facebook statistics indicate that more than 33,000 people saw a post by regular contributor, Paul Howard, containing pictures of the weekend of the Motorbike Grand Prix in the town centre taken about 1980 (see illustration). Without a doubt, posts such as Paul's help so many people reminisce about the town, get enjoyment, and quite often link up with Towcester people they used to know. It is a sad fact the many of the photographs we hold come to us devoid of crucial details such as the dates they were taken or the photographers who captured them—a result of the information being lost or never having been recorded at all.

Good local photographs are the key to getting public interest. However, as we delve further into the past, the visual record becomes increasingly sparse, with the earliest photographic examples in our collection dating to the 1860s and most historic drawings of the town are no earlier in date. This lack of early visual documentation creates a challenge when trying to bring the fascinating stories of Towcester's early history to life. While the town's history is rich with compelling narratives and significant events, the absence of contemporary illustrations, drawings, or paintings from earlier periods makes it difficult to present these stories in a way that captivates and engages the public. Without visual aids, these accounts are harder to connect with, and key moments in Towcester's past risk being overlooked or underappreciated. Modern photographs of historical buildings and artefacts offer some insight, but they can never fully convey the atmosphere and character of bygone eras.

The spring saw Towcester Mill Brewery pick up two awards, much to its delight!

In April, it was announced by CAMRA that the Mill's Tap Room had been awarded the prestigious 'Pub of the Year' award from CAMRA Northamptonshire. The pubs judged were all those in the county who are in the current 2025 Good Beer Guide and who were nominated by CAMRA members. Out of the nine shortlisted pubs across all of Northamptonshire, each pub was judged against criteria such as beer quality, their service and welcome, community focus, cleanliness and other factors which encouraged them to make a repeat visit. Now, the Mill will be pitted against each of the county winners from Bedfordshire, Buckinghamshire and Hertfordshire to find the regional winners – watch this space!
